Downtown and Uptown Saltsburg Routes

- PA Canal Path
 This corridor was originally the PA Mainline Canal as it traveled through Saltsburg between 1828 and 1864 and then became the route of the PA Railroad until the mid-1950s. Now, the Saltsburg Canal Park and part of the West Penn Trail preserve this site.
- Patterson/Altman Mill
 The 4- story feed, flour and grain mill, built in 1912, operated until the 1960's. Within the north side, the original Allis Chalmers equipment is still in place. Now the southern part of the building houses the Saltsburg Kayak and Canoe Outfitters business.
- Martin Restaurant Building
 In 1912, the original owners, Charles and Helen Martin, built this brick building to replace a one-story frame structure they had opened as a restaurant in 1889. Currently, the Point Street Tavern perpetuates the restaurant tradition in this building.
- The Freedom Tree
 In 1983, a small oak tree was planted in the Canal Park and dedicated to Saltsburg native, Capt. Robert Young, and all POW's and MIA's of the Vietnam War. This site was the location of Saltsburg's second Railroad Station from 1884 to 1954.
- Jonic Column Stone House Built in 1830, this house became the home of Dr. Thomas Murray in 1836, a noted physician and the first burgess of Saltsburg. The Greek Revival front porch with a second- floor balcony was added around 1910.
- Dr. Sterett House
 This two-story frame house, built in 1828, was enhanced with a mansard roof and Victorian trim in 1856. It was the home of Dr. Benjamin F. Sterett. Saltsburg's first resident physician.
